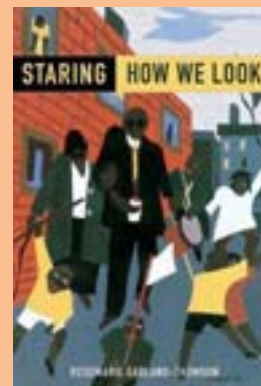
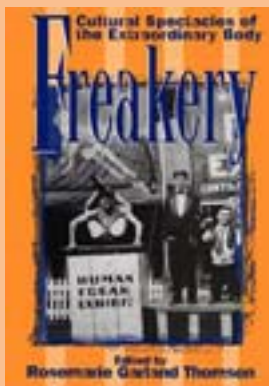
Why Disability? Or Who Should and Should Not Inhabit the World?
